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Shimla

Probably the most popular hill station in northern India, Shimla is the capital city of Himachal Pradesh famous for its Mall road.

Situated at a height of 2200 m, (7200ft) Shimla is one of the most eminent tourist destination in the country. Set amidst beautiful hills and mystical woods, Shimla is one of most aesthetically planned cities in India. An erstwhile summer capital of British India, this town's captivating natural beauty, and the atmosphere are bound to leave any tourist overwhelmed. The well-knit roads, impeccable cleanliness, and an efficient administration make for a perfect combination for any tourist destination in the world. This town has colonial-style buildings alongside the historic temples and the amalgamation of the worlds leaves everyone visiting this region spellbound. Within this city, one must visit the Mall Road, The Ridge, Institute of Advanced Studies and Jakhu Temple.

Mall Road,

The Mall Road in Shimla, located in the heart of the town, is the main street that is lined up with a myriad of restaurants, clubs, banks, shops, post offices and tourist offices. At the same time, the place boasts of the other exciting attractions that it houses, such as the Scandal Point and Kali Bari Temple. One of the busiest and more commercial areas of Shimla till date,

1. Scandal Point:

The Mall Road meets Ridge Road on the west side at this point. A statue of the great freedom fighter, Lala Lajpat Rai is erected here. Next to the scandal point is the General Post office of Shimla. It would be interesting to know how the place got its name. The Maharaja of Patiala eloped with the daughter of a British Viceroy from here, which caused much commotion and thus, the area began to be called "Scandal Point".

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2. Gaiety Theatre: Multiple famous film personalities have performed here. Even though this theatre has now been renovated, the original structure has been left untouched to preserve the heritage and natural beauty of this place.

3. Kali Bari Temple: A wooden image of goddess Kali, to whom this temple is dedicated, is worshipped here. Visit this temple for a dose of spirituality and religion.

4. Town Hall: This architectural marvel, which dates back to the colonial period; adds to the beauty of the surrounding architectural remains of the pre-independence era and is a must- visit place for all admirers of skill and structural design.

Kufri

While in Shimla, visit its colder, higher and less crowded cousin, Kufri just 13 km away from the main town. The views and sceneries here only get better, and the landscapes more flattering, a bit untouched with the tourist rush.

Manali

Situated at a height of 6260 feet above sea level, Manali is one of the most popular, beautiful and awe-inspiring hill stations in this country. A valley located in the Kullu district of Himachal Pradesh, Manali overwhelms its visitors by flowering apple trees and adventurous snow covered roads. Surrounded by majestic hills and woody forests, the quaint charm of Manali has captured the world's attention and has become one of the most visited. Tourist destinations in India. The pristine River Beas flows right through the town, creating a mesmerising and spellbinding landscape. Nestled at one end of the Kullu Valley, Manali is a popular hill station with attractions such as the Rohtang Pass and Solang Valley nearby. Rohtang Pass is covered with snow throughout the year and is a good experience in itself. This is the ideal place for tourists looking to unwind and rejuvenate in the lap of nature, for there is no place in the country more vibrant and charming as Manali.

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devotees love to visit including the Raghunath temple and Jagannathi Devith Temple being one of the important ones. Hadimba Temple, a 14th-century temple is famous for its wooden architecture and for its religious values.

Manali is also used as the base town for the Manali-Leh highway and Leh is around 479 km from here. Lahaul and Spiti district can also be accessed from here during the summers using the same highway.

Hadimba Temple.

The Hadimba Temple in Manali is a revered shrine dedicated to Hadimba Devi, an important figure from the Hindu epic Mahabharata. Situated amidst the picturesque snow-covered hills and cedar forests of Manali, this 14th-century temple stands out not only for its religious significance but also for its unique architectural style.

According to legend, Hadimba Devi was the wife of Bhima, one of the Pandava brothers, and the mother of Ghatothkach. She was originally a demoness who transformed into a goddess through rigorous penance. The temple is said to be built on the very spot where she meditated, on a large rock believed to embody her presence.

Built in 1553, the Hadimba Temple is renowned for its distinct architectural features. Unlike many other temples in the region, it boasts wooden doorways, walls adorned with stone and mud impressions, and a distinctive cone-shaped roof covered in metal. The temple's interior retains its original earthen beauty, decorated with figurines of goddesses, animals, and other symbolic elements.

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Solang Valley

When heading to Manali for a vacation, two absolutely essential destinations in the itinerary are Rohtang and Solang Valley. 14 kilometres to the north west of the main town of Manali, Solang Valley is one of the most popular tourist destinations in Himachal Pradesh. Situated on the way to Rohtang from Manali, every year the valley welcomes tourists in huge numbers. A favorite for adventure enthusiasts, Parachuting to paragliding, horse riding to driving mini open jeeps specially available for tourists of all age groups, Solang has it all.

During winters, as the valley is covered with snow, skiing is a popular sport here, with training institutes and trainers located in the valley to supervise skiers and train beginners. As the snow melts, skiing is taken over by zorbing. Another popular attraction of the valley, taking advantage of the slopes of the valley, you are likely to spot a huge transparent ball with mostly two people inside it rolling down the slope during summers, it is as much fun as it looks like. One of the most vibrant and enjoyable places in Manali, there is no way one can possibly miss this valley, while here.

Rohtang Pass

When planning a trip to Manali, a day off to the vista point of Rohtang is the ultimate and almost essential attraction of the tour.. Located at a distance of just 51 kilometres from the main town, Rohtang Pass can be reached only by road.(Rotang pass Permit and Transport your own please) The pass is located at a massive height of 3978 metres, the way up the hills is a treat to the eyes. As the vehicle climbs higher on the Manali- Keylong road, the beauty of the landscape around will leave you awestruck. A peculiar fact behind the name of the place is that it was named so because a number of people working in CBRE died whilst trying to cross this treacherous stretch. Owing to its splendid natural beauty, Rohtang Pass is a favourite among the community of film directors. Many blockbusters ranging from 'Jab We Met' to 'Yeh Jawani Hai Deewani' have been shot here.

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To travel beyond Rohtang, all visitors need a mandatory permit costing INR 500 per person, with an additional INR 50 congestion fee per vehicle imposed by the National Green Tribunal. Permits come in two types: one for up to Rohtang Pass and another for destinations beyond. Online permits can be booked, or offline permits are available on a first-come-first-serve basis from the Tourist Information Centre daily from 10:00 AM to 8:00 PM. Both four-wheelers and bikes are permitted.

The journey to Rohtang Pass offers a mesmerizing experience of nature's raw beauty, with snow-covered peaks, breathtaking landscapes, and serene silence. It's an opportunity to witness the magnificent white landscapes and immerse oneself in the tranquility of the high-altitude environment.

1. Take a day off for Rohtang. Leave for Rohtang early in the morning, as there are hundreds of others local tourist cabs visiting the pass and the narrow lanes gets jammed with traffic quickly.
2. Carry woollens and snacks, if possible pack a thermos of hot tea or coffee too. It would be the most useful up there.
3. When renting snow clothes, compare the prices with those fixed by the government.
4. Take care of your health, altitude sickness is common here.

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Manikaran

Manikaran, nestled in Himachal Pradesh's Kullu district, is a renowned destination for tourists visiting nearby Kullu and Manali. Located at an altitude of 5,700 feet alongside the Parvati River, it holds significant religious and mythological importance.

According to Hindu mythology, Manikaran is associated with several legends. It is believed that after a great flood, the law giver Manu recreated human life here. Another legend tells of Lord Shiva and Goddess Parvati staying in Manikaran, where a jewel from Parvati's earring fell into the river. When attempts to retrieve it failed, Shiva's anger caused him to open his third eye, but the Serpent God intervened, causing hot springs to erupt. These springs are said to contain jewels and possess healing properties, calming Shiva and soothing the surroundings.

The Gurudwara in Manikaran, known as Guru Nanak Devji Gurudwara, is revered by Sikhs as Guru Nanak, the founder of Sikhism, visited here. The Gurudwara offers langar (free meals) to all visitors. Additionally, temples dedicated to Lord Shiva and Ramchandra attract devotees.

Manikaran's hot springs are a major draw, believed to have therapeutic benefits. Pilgrims and visitors often take dips in the hot water to cleanse themselves spiritually and seek relief from ailments.

Overall, Manikaran stands out not only for its natural beauty and hot springs but also for its rich cultural and religious heritage, making it a significant pilgrimage site in Himachal Pradesh.

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KULLU

Kullu is a municipal council town that serves as the administrative headquarters of the Kullu district of the Indian state of Himachal Pradesh. It is located on the banks of the Beas River in the Kullu Valley about 10 kilometres (6.2 mi) north of the airport at Bhuntar, Kullu.

Kullu Valley is a broad open valley formed by the Beas River between Manali and Larji. This valley is known for its temples and its hills covered with pine and deodar forest and sprawling apple orchards. The course of the Beas river, Together with the river Beas running through the valley, the town of Kullu offers truly magnificent views. Kullu Valley is sandwiched between the Pir Panjal, Lower Himalayan and Great Himalayan Ranges, located in Northern India,
